

## Big Garden Birdwatch in the City January 2023

2023 is the 16th year we have counted birds in City gardens as part of the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch. We have created a database that enables us to look at trends in the relative numbers of different species through time and compare results with what is going on at the national level. This year we counted 19 different species (excluding feral pigeons) and just over 200 individual birds.

We would like to thank Aleksei who organised the birdwatch and the group of 12 volunteers who counted in 22 different City gardens.

## Results

- The number observations of nearly all species was higher this year than in 2022, with the exception of Goldfinches. The weather over the count weekend was sunny and dry, which may have partially contributed to the increase.
- Blue tits were still less numerous than Great tits. This may be a result of the hot dry summer in 2022 affecting insect prey, contributing to a poor breeding season for these small birds. Nationally, there are roughly 1.5

times more Blue tits (3.6 million pairs) than Great tits. The relative numbers of these two species in previous years in the City have more or less complied with this ratio until last year and again in 2023 when they were roughly equal. The nest box cleaning survey also revealed an almost 50/50 split of successful nests in the 2022 breeding season between these two species.

- Goldfinches were the most observed bird last year (17% of total observations) but observations this year were down substantially, confirming a trend we have seen throughout the winter.
- Other finches are also not faring so well. We have seen very few Chaffinch and Greenfinch over the last few years. Both these species have been affected by Trichomonosis, a disease spread by parasites.
- For the first time this year, Ring-necked parakeets were observed in the count. They have been regular visitors to Bunhill Fields over the past couple of years and bred there in 2022, taking over a Greater spotted woodpecker nest hole. The woodpecker was also observed in the count this year in Bunhill Fields and appears to be excavating a new nest hole.
- House sparrow observations have continued the upward trend and have now been recorded in five gardens across the City.

- We observed one Redwing, a common winter visitor in cold winters.
- Gardens with feeders, not surprisingly, hosted more species and more individual birds. We now feed regularly in 11 gardens.
- Nationally, the top three species in the 2022 Birdwatch (2023 results will not be available until mid-April) were House sparrows, followed by Starlings and Blue tits. In the City we have never recorded Starlings during the Birdwatch but large mixed flocks of adults and juveniles can be seen on the grass in St Paul's after the breeding season.
